Otaki College Commemorates the SS Otaki with a Memorial Ceremony

Ōtaki College held its ninth annual wreath-laying ceremony on March 10, 2025, honouring the sacrifice of the *SS Otaki* and its crew. This year's event also marked the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II, providing a solemn opportunity to reflect on the contributions of the Merchant Navy and those who served at sea during times of war.



The origins of this ceremony trace back to March 10, 1917, when the *SS Otaki*, a New Zealand Shipping Company vessel, was sunk by the German commerce raider *SMS Moewe*. In recognition of his extraordinary bravery, the ship's captain, Archibald Bisset Smith, was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross. Since 2017, Ōtaki College has held an annual event to honour this history and the enduring connection between Ōtaki College and Robert Gordon's College in Scotland, where Smith was once a student.

The 2025 ceremony gathered dignitaries, students, and military representatives to pay tribute to both the *SS Otaki* and the New Zealanders who served in World War II. Among the distinguished guests were Mr. Tim Costley, MP for Ōtaki; Mr. Tākuta Ferris, MP for Te Tai Tonga; Mayor Janet Holborow; and representatives of the Royal New Zealand Navy, Air Force, and Army. Veterans, members of the Merchant Navy Association, and local iwi were also present, further reinforcing the deep sense of history and remembrance.

A Solemn and Respectful Observance

The event commenced with the arrival of the Official Party, welcomed by Ōtaki College Principal, Mr. Andy Fraser, alongside student leaders Keita Broughton-Alp and Logan Boyer. The national anthem, sung with music provided by The Combined Bands of The Salvation Army Levin Corps and Levin & Districts Brass, set the tone for the day's proceedings.

A significant moment of the ceremony occurred at noon, when an RNZAF Harvard aircraft performed a flyover, symbolising the courage and sacrifice of all New Zealanders who fought in World War II. This was followed by keynote addresses, including a speech by Rear Admiral (Retired) David Ledson, who emphasized the enduring legacy of the Merchant Navy.

A particularly meaningful presence at the event was that of members of the Arctic Convoy Club of New Zealand, including President Derek Whitwam, Sydney Wells and Stan Welch (pictured below left to right). These veterans, who endured the perilous Arctic Convoys that supplied the Soviet Union during World War II, were specially acknowledged for their remarkable resilience and service in some of the harshest conditions of the war. Their participation reinforced the strong ties between New Zealand's maritime history and the global efforts of the Allied forces.



Students from Ōtaki College played a central role in the ceremony, reciting readings, hymns, and commemorative poetry. The traditional exchange of crests between Principal Andy Fraser and Mr. Paul Baggott, President of the New Zealand Merchant Navy Association, reinforced the historical ties between Ōtaki College and the maritime community.

The Wreath Laying: A Gesture of Respect

The highlight of the event was the wreath-laying ceremony, where representatives from various organizations placed floral tributes to honour those who lost their lives at sea. Government officials, veterans, military representatives, and students participated in this solemn act, acknowledging the sacrifices made by merchant seafarers.

Following this, The Last Post was played by Mr. David Miller, as flags were lowered to half-mast in a poignant moment of reflection. The Ode of Remembrance was then recited in both Māori and English, concluding with the response: "We will remember them."



A Lasting Legacy

The ceremony concluded with a blessing and dismissal led by Reverend Lance Lukin, followed by the departure of the Official Party. Guests were then invited to a luncheon at the Ōtaki RSA, where further stories and memories were shared.



New Arctic Convoys book published



Dr Roderick G. Maclean of Stornoway has released a historical book on the Convoys to Russia, based at Loch Ewe and manned by Gaelic-speaking sailors from the Highlands and Islands. The book, translated from his 2022 Gaelic work "Cha Till Mise", focuses on *HMS Achates*. Professor Ronald Black, retired Senior Lecturer in Celtic Studies at the University of Edinburgh and formerly Gaelic Editor of the Scotsman, calls it a

Arctic Convoy members awarded Norwegian Military Medal

In a recent poignant ceremony in Wellington, two Royal Navy veterans, Derek Whitwam (below image centre) and Stan Welch (below image left), were recognised for their invaluable contributions to the liberation of Norway during World War II. Both veterans were awarded the Defence Medal and the Norwegian Government Commemorative Medal in a gesture that celebrates their enduring legacy.

Derek Whitwam served on *HMS Berwick*, which played a significant role in transporting Norwegian military personnel to Bergen and Trondheim in mid-1945. The ship also created



fond memories among Norwegians, hosting local schoolchildren during its visits to Trondheim. Earlier, *HMS Berwick* had been involved in a high-risk mission - Operation Freeman - in November 1944, ferrying Norwegian troops to Murmansk. This mission allowed the troops to join Soviet forces in liberating Eastern Finnmark, a dangerous operation that underscored the Allied commitment to freeing occupied territories.

Stan Welch served aboard *HMS Apollo*, a vessel pivotal to Norway's freedom. On 13 May 1945, *HMS Apollo* transported Crown Prince Olav and other prominent Norwegian officials back to their homeland after years of occupation. Beyond this historic voyage, *HMS Apollo* was instrumental in mine-laying operations along the Norwegian coast during late 1944 and early 1945. Notably, the ship was part of the perilous Operation Spellbinder in January 1945, during which the convoy was met with fierce resistance from German naval forces and aircraft.

The medals awarded symbolize profound gratitude for their efforts. The Defence Medal, crafted by Oslo's J. Tostrup firm, features Norway's national colours and the words "Participant in the struggle." The Norwegian Government Commemorative Medal was established in honour of the 70th anniversary of Norway's liberation, underscoring ongoing appreciation for Allied sacrifices.

This recognition serves as a lasting tribute to Welch and Whitwam, whose bravery and dedication remain an enduring beacon of hope and resilience.
